Building on the basis of the error, building the basis of the error, defense and basic position. This responsibility requires the availability of three pillars, namely, error, damage and causation.

Then we discussed the responsibility of the person responsible for supervision and its conditions, the responsibility of the subordinate for the actions of the subordinate and its terms and conditions, the responsibility arising from things, their three types, and the conditions for each of them.

Then we moved to the study of the general rule in enrichment without a reason, where we dealt with the pillars of enrichment without a reason, and its provisions, as we dealt with the payment of the undeserved, by explaining its terms and provisions, as well as we dealt with the virtue by explaining the pillars of virtue and its provisions.

Finally, we moved to the study of law as a direct source of commitment.
